


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
ASAP Activities


It is not unknown that the politics and power dynamics of online spaces only reflect the inherent patriarchy existing in our offline world and it doesnt help that many tech platforms are predominantly run and controlled by cis het males who are often indifferent to the structural oppression and the resultant consequences faced by many marginalized people online.

In this context, while we can welcome the 'rediscovering' of our online voices, it becomes important to ensure that the oppressed, be it women, LGBTQIA members, anti-race or anticaste activists, all of us must be able to efficiently use these tools (smartphone, internet, social media etc) to shape the strategy and narrative for ourselves and our communities, because otherwise our online participation may always be susceptible to challenges like threats to privacy, harassment, online violence, trolling.



In order to unpack the complexities as well as understand ways of managing them, this year while continuing to build inclusive movements, we will also be working towards 'Shaping Safer Online Spaces' as part of our overarching theme. We believe that it is our collective responsibility as human rights and safe abortion rights defenders to claim these online spaces.

We want to encourage discourses that are effective and safe, in order to maximize the potential of these 'online tools' so that we are all able to bring our politics on it and not just some privileged few and we look forward to undertaking this challenging work in collaboration with all of you!



The Amazing Flabby Breasted Virgin & Other Sordid Tales | February 2022

ASAP in collaboration with <u>KathaSiyah</u>, held the first screening of their play this year, which has been in planning and was inspired around two years ago from the writings of Coordinator Dr Suchitra Dalvie (<u>Being a Feminist Gynaecologist in a Patriarchal World</u>), picked up and then produced by Ayesha Susan Thomas, who's a a Feminist Theater Practioner, Teacher and Co-Founder of KathaSiyah.

The Amazing Flabby-Breasted Virgin & Other Sordid Tales is a playful, irreverent digital performance. This performance is part of an educational arts project on systemic issues in both medicine and education today. It plays with the myths and magical thinking that surround and define the non- masculine, non-heterosexual body. It poses surreal and satirical questions about how women's bodies are taught, perceived and practiced within medical education in the urban Indian context.

FBV has taken multiple iterations over the past 2 years. It survived a global pandemic, and emerged stronger as a hybrid performance intervention. In its present form, FBV uses what is available and real to us in the changed world of live performance—film, performance, and an interactive website. The performative archive on an interactive website was created in a hybrid team—offline actors and online designers and artists. In our future dreams for FBV we seek to reimagine the show as an offline, live performance.

CAN Activities

Youth Led SRHR Advocacy Nepal (YoSHAN)



National Workshop on Convention on elimination of all forms of discrimination Against Women

YoSHAN participated in a Workshop organized by BBC to prepare the shadow report which is sent to the CEDAW committee. YoSHAN provided recommendation to decriminalize the safe abortion.

F for Feminism

Forum for Women Law and Development (FWLD) in collaboration with IPAS and CRR organized the programme "F' for feminism, where all the national stakeholders including Family Welfare Division as well as the donors and activists working on safe abortion and contraception participated in the program.

Women's Day celebration | National Commission for Women

National Women Commission organized the program on occasion of International Women's Day where YoSHAN was invited as an stakeholder working to promote gender equality and reproductive rights.

Youth Consultation on Safe Abortion

YoSHAN collaborated with Safe Motherhood Network Federation (SMNF) and Leo Club of Kathmandu to organize an awareness session on Safe abortion rights with 21 young participants.



Youth Advocacy Network Sri Lanka (YANSL)



'WE HEAR YOU' Website Launched

The website includes embedded videos developed as part of the Women Fund Asia Project on access to SRHR prior to and following the Covid 19 pandemic. The videos feature stories from participants representing women and girls, people with disabilities, and the LGBTQ+ community.



IG3 Grant



YANSL was selected as a winner of the Y-Peer Asia Pacific Centre and Youth LEAD's Innovative Grants 3.0 for the translation of an SRHR manual. The project proposal was to translate an SRHR training handbook into Sri Lanka's indigenous languages, namely Sinhala and English, and to redesign it for Sri Lanka. A translation skills training session was also organized to increase the capacities of selected participants in preparation for the translation of the SRHR manual.

PROJECT PAHARA

Six webinars were held on sexual and gender-based violence as part of Project Pahara, which was conducted by Kasuni Ganga and Tharindi Abeynayake. A short animated video was also created to illustrate the experience of a woman who was exposed to SGBV during the Covid 19 pandemic-induced lockdown. A basic CSE session covering anatomy, gender, SGBV, family planning, and STIs was also conducted in Galle (Southern Province) for 15 teenagers from the area who have never received CSE training

Sri Lankan Queer History


